Slavic Fest Honors “Women In Slavic Arts”

The 37th Sugar Creek Slavic Festival is coming **June 7th and 8th**, featuring five-time Grammy Nominee LynnMarie and the Polka Guys from Nashville, TN. This year they’re honoring women artists who make the event come to life through music, dance, food, fashion, folk art and more.

As the first woman nominated for a Grammy in the polka category, LynnMarie has played a leading role in preserving Slavic heritage. She has performed around the world with legendary artists like Willie Nelson. LynnMarie says she’s excited to return to Slavic Fest, “I’m really looking forward to being a part of Slavic Fest this year, especially since they are celebrating women in Slavic arts! I look forward to entertaining the amazing crowds, and it’s an honor to be asked to be a part of such a great event!”

This festival is the oldest and largest Slavic Festival in the U.S., attracting visitors and vendors from several states. Sugar Creek is well represented, too, with the Sugar Creek Ethnic Dance Troupe, Kolo Kids, and Tamburitzans performing. Kema’s Bakery and Downtown Sugar Creek will be serving food, and members of St Cyril Parish will be baking and serving cabbage roll meals. With other vendors coming from multiple states, this year’s festival is set to be the best yet.

The festival is managed by the all-volunteer Sugar Creek Fair & Festival Board. See the callout for times you can lend a hand. Funding is provided by sponsors and arts grants with proceeds used to support civic projects in Sugar Creek.

FROM THE DESK OF MAYOR MIKE LARSON...

Council Meeting Minutes 3/11/2024

- The Mayor asked for a moment of silence for Officer Cody Allen, Process Server Drexel Mack, a speedy recovery for John Kelsey and Charlie Steele.

- Bridget Beltran led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance. Roll call established a quorum, and the Consent Agenda was passed unanimously.

- The Mayor presented four Certificates of Appreciation to Chief Soule for the actions of 4 of our Sugar Creek Police Officers on March 7.

- The Mayor asked for approval to appoint Ms. Bridget Beltran to the Planning and Zoning Commission. The Aldermen approved unanimously.

- In business from the floor, Kim from KC Public Library updated the assembly on the Library's upcoming activities.

- Seeing no further business from the floor, the Mayor presented one bill to the Aldermen. It passed unanimously.

- a) Bill # 4717 approved entering into a Letter of Intent with Missouri American Water to conduct an evaluation of the Sugar Creek water and wastewater systems.

- The Mayor and Mr. Kenney met with the Remediation Manager for BP. Areas of the BP property may be ready for development later this year.

- Alderman Steffen thanked the SCPD for assisting with an incident on Buckeye Property.

- Alderman Ray asked about tree trimming clean up along Lexington. Mr. Hedrick said he would make sure the tree trimmers cleaned up the cuttings.

- Alderwoman Griego thanked the SCPD for assisting with an incident at her bakery. She also thanked Public Works for the cleanup at Roberts and Sugar Creek Blvd.

- Chief Soule informed the Council on the following: 1) Best Buy Auto was posted for violations. All postings were subsequently removed. 2) The dispatch is in need of applicants. 3) The Chief requested signatures from elected officials to obtain State money to be used for various needs in the Police Department. 4) With weather getting nicer, SCPD will begin issuing Ordinance Violations. 5) The VFW held a fund raiser for John Kelsey. The turnout was amazing and the money raised has topped \$28,000.

- Chief Richardson had to take one

of the fire trucks to MHC Kenworth for repairs. The estimate of \$13,390 is for an ABS light, a turbo, and repairs on the transmission.

- Mrs. McGhee reported the following: 1) The Sugar Creek website is in the process of a redesign. 2) A summer intern position will be posted on the website. This intern will work in City Hall. 3) The employee benefits luncheon will be held at Mike Onka Hall on April 30, 2024. During this time, offices will be closed from 11:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. 4) The Norman and Mary Anne Davidson scholarship will be open for applications until April 1.

- Mrs. Guthrie mentioned she is cross training her staff.

- Mr. Hedrick has had another busy month: 1) In the gym, a gas leak was fixed and a water leak was fixed. 2) The tuck pointing at the gym is waiting for nicer weather. 3) Ordered equipment is still on hold. 4) The lead and copper inventory is almost complete. Only six services appear to have been constructed with lead. 5) The MS4 audit pointed out several violations. All have been remedied ahead of schedule.

- Mr. Gustin and the building department have issued 16 permits, supervised construction of a new house on Lexington, reported cleanup of a junk yard on Allen Road, shared progress of a new retaining wall at Dollar General and checked on barricades around a burned house on Lexington.

- In closed session, a legal matter was discussed with instructions to get more details before making a decision or taking a vote.

- By unanimous consent, the meeting adjourned at 6:50 p.m.

Council Meeting Minutes 3/25/2024

- The meeting was called to order by the Mayor at 6:00 p.m. Drake Richardson led the Pledge of Allegiance. Roll call established a quorum and Consent Agenda was passed unanimously.

- In Business from the Floor, Mr. Bill Haman requested the reduced rental rate for Onka Hall for an acoustical music event to be held in August. The Aldermen approved the \$150 rate for the August event.

- Mr. Jerry Zevecke asked if Mr. Ed Richardson could be appointed and

approved to be a member of the Parks and Rec Committee.

- The Mayor then asked for approval on two bills. The Alderman passed both unanimously.

- a) #4718 approved a lease with Evergy Missouri West for use of the Evans lot.

- b) #4719 authorized payment to MHC Kenworth for emergency repairs to Pumper 1 Fire Truck.

- Mr. Kenney asked for appointment and approval for Ms. Katherine Cole to the Board of Equalization for 2024-2025. The appointment was approved unanimously.

- The Mayor asked for appointment of three members to the Parks and Rec Committee. Mr. Ed Richardson and Mrs. Angel Frantz were both approved unanimously to the Committee. Mrs. Lisa Richardson was approved unanimously to the Committee as an alternate.

- Mrs. McGhee asked for the Aldermen to approve the 2024-2025 health insurance rates for employees. The Aldermen approve unanimously as there was no increase to the rates.

- The Mayor reported that he will be applying for a \$50,000 grant from MARC to be used on a feasibility study for reuse of the BP property.

- Alderwoman Hazelrigg asked if benches could be purchased and installed at the new park. Mrs. Smith said that is in the long-range plans. The Alderwoman also asked what progress is being made on the old Best Buy car lot. Chief Soule said they are getting close.

- Alderman Steffen asked again about the gunfire on the north side of the Missouri River in the KC Port Authority. Chief Soule is looking into this situation.

- Alderwoman Griego asked about the Evans Lot. Mr. Kenney assured her the lot would be ready for the Slavic Festival.

- Mr. Kenney reported on his activities since the last meeting: 1) On Wednesday, Missouri American Water will be in the city taking inventory of the infrastructure. 2) Mr. Kenney is working on an RFP to be sent out to area trash haulers to acquire bids. 3) Republic Trash had been doing fairly good for several weeks, but something happened over the last two weeks. 4) Lauber Municipal Law will offer City Officials training. 5) Missouri Municipal League will offer a similar Elected Officials

Fire Department

FIRESIDE CHAT– As warmer weather approaches, many of us are eager to dust off our grills, Blackstones and smokers for summer barbecues. Grilling food outdoors with family and friends is an American pastime, but it's crucial to prioritize safety to prevent accidents and ensure a pleasant experience for all. The Sugar Creek Fire Department would like to share safe grilling tips so you can enjoy your outdoor cooking without having to meet some of our department's firefighters.

- Choose a suitable location for your grill, ensuring it is placed on a stable surface away from any structures, such as a residence, garage or patio.

- Maintain a distance of at least 10 feet from any flammable materials to minimize the risk of fire.

- Keep an eye on children and pets: While cooking, it is important to supervise children and keep pets away from the grilling area.

- Regular Maintenance: Before lighting your grill for the season, give it a thorough check to make sure it's working properly.

- Clean off any accumulated grease and check for gas leaks.

- If using a gas grill, check the hoses and connections for signs of wear or damage.

- Safe ignition: When lighting the grill or cooking surface, carefully follow the manufacturer's instructions.

- Open the lid before lighting the burners and never lean over the grill while lighting.

- Proper ventilation is important when grilling to prevent the buildup of harmful gases such as carbon monoxide.

- Never use the grill indoors; cooking in enclosed spaces can lead to carbon monoxide poisoning and other safety hazards.

- For grease fires, never use water as this can spread the fire.

By following these safety tips, you can enjoy your outdoor grilling experience with peace of mind.

LARGE ROLL OFF CONTAINER RENTAL– Contact Republic Services at 816-521-3110 to set up a roll off container. Cost is \$142.00 for Sugar Creek residents. You will need to know the dates you want it dropped off and picked up. The containers are only allowed to be on your property for 7 days. You will need to bring a current City of Sugar Creek utility bill to the Public Works Department to get a permit for Republic to haul it off.

FROM THE WATER DEPARTMENT– A reminder to all residents: water meters can NOT be turned on or off by the homeowner or contractors. If you need to have the meter turned off for repairs, please contact City Hall to arrange a time for service. Thank you for your cooperation.

Training in Columbia in June.

- Chief Soule wanted everyone to know that they have been dealing with several unhoused issues. Theft of copper has been reported at the Old Dollar Tree store. The Police Department will begin citing violators for tall grass, abandoned vehicles and such as the weather warms up.

- Chief Richardson has been fighting grass fires both in Sugar Creek and in Independence when called for mutual aid.

- Mrs. McGhee reminded everyone that the Norman and Mary Anne Davidson Scholarship deadline is April 1. City officials met with the Revize Web Designer to work on updating the website. City offices will be closed on 4/30 for the Health Benefits Fair during the Employee Luncheon held at Mike Onka Hall.

- Mrs. Guthrie reported the accounting firm responsible for our financial audit will be completing the audit soon.

- Mr. Hedrick reported a lot of activity this month: 1) Harrison Park is open. 2) While working on opening Kaw Field a water leak was discovered and delayed the opening of Kaw Field. 3) New curbs are being installed at Community Park. 4) Tuck pointing on the Gym will begin on April 8. 5) Still waiting new equipment ordered last year. 6) The storm water drain at Scarritt and Carlisle has been cleaned out. 7) Bids for additional electrical outlets are being collected. 8) The Board was asked to approve a building maintenance

agreement with EMCOR Fagan. After research was presented to the Board, the Board approved unanimously.

- Mrs. Smith reported the Kite Festival held jointly with Independence has drawn the interest of 30,000.

- Mr. Gustin had lots to report: 1) A house on Kentucky is being built. 2) The new laundry is making progress in moving into the Old Dollar Tree. 3) Mr. Prier has 3 court cases this week. 4) Everygy asked about the positioning of lights at Harris and US 24 Highway. Mr. Gustin thought it is better to wait until 24 Highway improvements are complete before we put up streetlights. 5) A streetlight has been requested on Allen Road. 6) MODOT Construction along US 24 Highway is continuing with a lot of business entrances, sidewalks and curbs developing.

- In new business, the Mayor let everyone know that the last mass at St. Cyril's will be held on April 28.

- Mr. Kenney also told everyone that Sugar Creek United Methodist will also be closing in May.

- The Council voted into Closed Session to discuss a real estate matter. After discussion, questions and answers the Board approved the Mayor's actions concerning reuse of the BP property.

- The Board voted out of Closed Session.

- Seeing no further business, the Aldermen voted unanimously to adjourn at 7:15 p.m.
