New Park To Make A Splash In Sugar Creek



The weather is finally warming up, and Sugar Creek is excited to offer residents a chance to cool down.

The City will host the official grand opening ceremony of the first splash park on June 18. The Sweet Water Splash Park is located at Kaw Field beside the tennis courts on Putnam Street.

Pam Burnham, Parks and Recreation Program Director, said the city will mark the event with a “noodle cutting” by children at 1:00 p.m. The celebration will include some tropical water games and a visit from the Kona Ice Truck.

“It will be a great addition to our parks allowing our younger generations to enjoy a water feature in Sugar Creek,” Burnham said, adding the park provides many benefits to the whole community. “(It is) an added area where parents and children can enjoy the sunny outdoors

together.”

The Sugar Creek Municipal Pool used to offer this to the community. It opened July 1955 off Kentucky and Sterling and offered two wading pools for children, a 60 by 120 foot pool and three diving boards. Unfortunately, high maintenance costs and decreased attendance led to the pool being closed in 1993 and dismantled in 1998.

Burnham said the splash park is more economical because there is little maintenance and uses a non-electric water delivery system.

“That is perfect for locations where electrical service would be difficult and costly to provide,” Burnham said. “Also, it will have an on/off timer with programmable hours of operation.”

Those hours of operation have not been determined. The Public Works Department will work with the Board of Aldermen and other

City officials to determine the best hours of operation.

The City plans to install sidewalks and a covered structure for shaded seating. There are bathrooms available at nearby Kaw Field. Burnham said non-profit organizations may offer concessions during the summer as part of their fundraising efforts.

Burnham would like to remind residents that parking is not allowed on nearby streets during major community events like the upcoming Slavic Fest.

“Plan accordingly if visiting the Sweet Water Splash Park during those times, as parking will be a moderate walk away from the park,” Burnham said. “Also, City of Sugar Creek, MO Parks Rules and Regulations apply to the Sweet Water Splash Park as well. A copy of Park Rules and Regulations may be obtained at City Hall.”

Council Meeting Minutes 4/11/2022

• After a moment of silence for the passing of Mr. Ed Pallo and for peace in the Ukraine, the meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m.

• Mr. Ben Hedrick led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance followed by roll call and the unanimous passing of the Consent Agenda.

• In Business from the floor, a reduced fee was discussed for the use of LaBenite Park for a two-day event. The Board agreed to rent the park for the two-day event.

• Five ordinances were presented to the Board. All passed unanimously.

a) #4523 declared the results of the April 5, 2022 Municipal Election.

b) #4524 authorized an annual subscription for Neptune Water meters.

c) #5425 authorized payment to Holliday Sand and Gravel for deicing salt.

d) #4526 authorized payment to MHC Kenworth for emergency engine repairs.

e) #4527 approved a bid and authorized payment to Heritage Tractor for the purchase of a John Deere Tractor.

• Mrs. McGhee presented the new health insurance rates to the Board. The Board approved the rates unanimously.

• The Mayor again asked for suggestions for an MML Civic Award Citizen of the Year for 2022.

• Alderman Ray asked about the fencing at the Hink basketball courts and Kaw Field Tennis Courts. Playground equipment at Hink basketball courts was discussed.

• Alderman Mikulich presented a suggestion to make a walking trail out of the abandoned railroad tracks running from Carlisle to Kentucky.

• Alderwoman Hazelrigg echoed the fencing at the Hink Drive location, and where to place playground equipment. The Alderwoman wanted to know when the city could use Roper field, Kenney field or the Pavilion for gatherings. The short answer is we can use any of those properties by reserving them from the Independence School District.

• Mr. Casey wanted to know if a business owner could sell beer during the Fourth of July fireworks display. Mr. Casey reminded everyone we have exhausted avenues of getting the word out about the availability of lots for sale at 24 and Sterling.

• Chief Soule is still looking for dis-

patchers and police officers. Alderman Mikulich asked Chief Soule to enforce the 7-day rule on dumpsters.

• Chief Richardson commented the Missouri River Cleanup went well. SC Fire used their rescue boat to assist with moving volunteers. The Organization commented on how well all departments of the city pulled together to assist in this project.

• Mr. Cary received the first drawings for the Domino's Restaurant, and a section of the Old Dollar Tree has been demoed. SC Elementary will receive improvements and remodeling this summer.

• Mrs. McGhee reported the extension of the Mary Anne Davidson Scholarship deadline produced three applicants.

• Mrs. Guthrie reported the city is 50% through its fiscal year with revenues running at 39% and expenses running at 51%.

• Mrs. Burnham stated the Grand Opening of the Disc Golf Course went well and there are commemorative discs for sale at City Hall for \$15. Music Bingo continues to grow, and over 30 players attended recently.

• Mr. Hedrick's dump truck is now back in service, and the new John Deere tractor will arrive soon. Fire Hydrant tests have begun. The salt bin is in need of repair and bids have been accepted.

• Seeing no further business from the floor and no need for a closed session, the Mayor asked the Aldermen to adjourn – SINE DIE – the Board will resume at a later date. Could be minutes, hours or days.

• In this case, the Board resumed in just 5 minutes after the City Clerk asked for roll call to confirm a quorum. The reason for the second meeting was to install the newly elected Aldermen. Alderman Ray and Alderman Steffen were sworn in by City Clerk, Christine McGhee.

• The Mayor asked for the Aldermen to approve Mr. Chuck Mikulich to be the next Mayor Pro Tem or Council President from the next year. This motion was approved unanimously.

• The Mayor then asked for a motion and second to adjourn. The Council Meeting adjourned at 7:35 pm.

Council Meeting Minutes 4/25/2022

• In the moment of silence, the Mayor asked to remember the lives of Ms. Phyllis Camerlynck and Mr. David Copeland.

• The Mayor also asked for the speedy recovery of Mr. Tom Caffery and for peace in Ukraine.

• After the Pledge of Allegiance and Roll Call, the Consent Agenda was passed unanimously.

• A proclamation was presented to Ms. Lauren Palmer from MARC for the 50 years the organization has been in existence working with the Metro community and proclaiming June 10, 2022 as "MARC - Forward Day".

• A Certificate of Appreciation was given to Mr. Mark Stefancik, Sr. for his stellar efforts as Gym and Mike Onka Hall monitor.

• Seven bills were presented to the Board.

a) #4528 issued payment for reserve fire accident and sickness insurance.

b) #4529 authorized payment for lights on Kaw Football Field. This ordinance passed with 3 ayes and 1 nay.

c) #4530 approved an amendment to the contract with Tyler Technologies.

d) #4531 amends SC Code of Ordinances to allow for an appointed Police Chief beginning in April of 2025.

e) #4532 amends SC Code of Ordinances to the \$50 business license fee.

f) #4533 authorized payment to the KC Readymix TIF plan.

g) #4534 authorized payment for the repair of a SC snow plow.

• A motion was made and seconded to accept the updated fee schedule for the City of Sugar Creek, Mo.

• The Mayor mentioned that he had received four names to nominate for the MML Citizen of the year. The Mayor said he would announce his decision next Council meeting.

• Alderman Steffen mentioned donated trees from Schwope, naming them as an in-kind sponsor for 2022, complimented the Public Works staff for helping with planting the trees and for the help with the BBQ Contest. The Aldermen voted 4-0 to put watering the new trees at LaBenite on the Public Works priority list.

• Alderman Ray complimented the planning and preparation for the BBQ Contest.

• Alderwoman Hazelrigg asked about the homeless living on the Independence/SC border.

• Mr. Casey showed a map of planned

NEWS FROM CITY DEPARTMENTS

Police Department

CHIEF'S CHAT– Keep the following safety tips in mind as the weather changes to help make this a great summer!

Vehicle Safety:

- Do not leave your vehicle unattended with its windows down or doors unlocked. Secure your vehicle AT ALL TIMES, EVEN AT HOME!
- If you leave your vehicle outside overnight, keep it in a well-lit area as a deterrent.
- Make sure all valuables are out of sight or removed from your vehicle.
- Never leave children or pets unattended in vehicles. Please note that temperatures inside of a vehicle can be considerably warmer than the temperature outside. Excessive heat can cause serious injury or death.

When Going On Vacation:

- If you are going out of town, you can notify the Sugar Creek Police Department and set up a vacation watch.
- Make sure your home is locked up and secure.
- Stop receiving mail or arrange for family or friends to pick it up for you.
- Set a light on a timer inside of your home to create the appearance of activity inside.
- Exterior motion sensor lighting can aid in deterring crime.
- Keep valuables hidden from the general public. Place valuables in a safe if possible.
- Do not post your vacation plans on social media.

When Riding Bicycles:

- Check your bike to make sure the tires are inflated and the brakes are working. Put reflectors on the front and back of your bike.
- Protect yourself by wearing a safety helmet and pads.
- If you ride your bicycle on the street, be sure to keep to the right and follow all traffic signs.
- Keep an eye out for oncoming traffic, yield to vehicles, and signal when turning.
- Use the crosswalks and yield to pedestrians. If you have to cross at an intersection, look both ways and walk your bike to the other side.
- Maintain vigilance and keep an eye out for potential hazards.
- When you park your bike, make sure you lock it up. Register your bike and serial number with the Police Department.

LARGE ITEM TRASH– Since November 2016, the City of Sugar Creek has contracted with Republic Services for trash and recycling collection. Since that time, the city no longer has a large item pickup for residents. As a resident, you can contact Republic to pick up items from your residence, such as a couch or dresser. The first item is free, and each additional item is an extra charge. You can arrange for multiple pickups, but only one item per pickup. Be sure to let the operator know that it is a Sugar Creek, MO address and there will be no charge for one item. The Republic Services phone number is 816-254-1470.

Residents can also obtain a landfill permit from Public Works; bring your Sugar Creek utility bill and the date you will be going to the landfill. Our office hours are 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Please note permits are date-specific.

deep mining already taking place and mentioned the update on the Sugar Creek Channel project.

- Chief Richardson handed out ideas for the Knox Box project.
- Mr. Cary updated the Council on Domino's, Central Bank, two fires, Stix & Stones and the old Dollar Tree.
- Ms. McGhee stated while there were 3 applications for the Mary Anne Davidson Scholarship Fund – none were from Sugar Creek.
- Ms. Guthrie told the Board that the City was 60% of the way through the fiscal year with 41% of revenues in and 55% of expenses accounted for.
- Ms. Burnham asked for approval for Parks and Recreation Board members. The Board voted unanimously to extend the approval to four current members but realized that the P&R Board needs one more. The LaBenite playground equipment will be delivered and installed soon. Splash park will be dedicated on 6/18.
- Mr. Hedrick mentioned that the new tractor will be in next week and Wil-Pav will install the sidewalks to the splash park soon.
- In closed session, the Board voted unanimously to give three individuals raises and offer a part-time contract to a CDL bus driver.
- Coming out of closed session, Alderman Steffen proposed \$13 per hour for part-time summer help. The Board voted unanimously to approve the raise and adjourned at 7:05 pm.
